About New England Flag Football

- ✓ League started in 2004 under NFL FLAG with just 34 kids on 4 teams & 2 girls (Catarina, Kenia)
- ✓ 2005 formed our first girls all-star team and qualified for Nationals
- ✓ By 2006 the league grew to ~600 players and ~20 girls & 2 female coaches
- ✓ 2009 we became a 501(c)3 non-profit organization
- ✓ Today ~10,000+ kids participating in all our leagues, which continues to grow every season.
- ✓ We also run 5 large tournaments a year, with ~8,000+ participants.
- ✓ In 2019 we had over 600 girls participating in our leagues with 20+ female coaches (co-ed, all-girls team, all-girls league)
- ✓ 22 all-girls teams at our last tournament, ages 10U-17U

Type of Leagues

Girls Teams

- ✓ Coaches form all-girl teams that play against the boys in the regular leagues.
- ✓ We offer this in ALL age groups
- ✓ Mixed results from not winning a game to winning multiple league Championships (Lynn)

Co-ed

- ✓ Majority of the girls in our leagues play co-ed flag football
- ✓ Sign up as individuals and play with and against the boys
- ✓ We pair up girls when possible
- ✓ Playing time is paramount
- **✓** Feel like part of the TEAM



All-Girls League

- ✓ 2 years ago we started an all-girls league, grew to 18 teams last season
- ✓ Neutral site, varied age groups (6-8, 9-11, 12-15)
- ✓ Made it an event (music, stats, stadium)
- ✓ Play Spring, Fall and Winter
- ✓ Recruit from other sports





Player Experiences

Create an experience!!

Be more than just cones on a field.

Make it an experience that they will never forget!!

- ✓ <u>Leagues</u> Regardless of which route you take, make it a big deal, coaches/parents will help a lot with this!!
- ✓ <u>Tournaments</u> Attend tournaments, find your level, set expectations, PRACTICE, talk to other coaches at the tournaments, we're in this together.
- ✓ <u>Camps/Clinics</u> Run co-ed and or all-girl camps and clinics, it's a great way to introduce girls to the game!
- ✓ **Events** Attend events with your team, women's tackle games, college games, arena football games, Punt, Pass and Kick.
- ✓ <u>Recruit</u> Nearly every female flag football player we've had plays another sport, talk to the players/parents/coaches to see if their friends want to come out and try flag football
- ✓ Try-outs Hold a try out every spring and fall, you'll get new players coming in





Promotion

- ✓ Share your story and photos
- ✓ Its free, easy and most people are on it in
- ✓ Facebook for the parents, Instagram for kids 13+, Twitter, etc.

Let EVERYONE know what you're doing!

- ✓ Contact your local newspaper/patch/TV station!! They love human interest stories especially ones like these with girls teams participating in leagues and WINNING, traveling to tournaments, regionals/nationals.
- ✓ Contact your local high school, college and NFL team (half time game)





Financing

- ✓ League fees: Every market is different but set a competitive price, don't offer free registration, you need a commitment from the player and parent and the registration fee is the commitment.
- ✓ Scholarships: You can still offer scholarships to those who need it, create an application form, offer donations during registration. Limit # of scholarships, per season and per person.
- ✓ Fundraising: Try to limit fundraising to once or twice a year. (Parents get burned out)

- ✓ Donations: Reach out to local businesses, start with the parents of the players in your league or on your team
- ✓ Travel costs: Keep to a minimum when possible, will ensure everyone on the team can make it, as a league we always cover the entry fee, transport and provide jerseys, parents are responsible for accommodations. Where there's a will there's a way!!

Scheduling

VERY IMPORTANT — Whether its your league, your practice schedule or camp, make sure you have the least conflicts possible. Reach out to other league directors/presidents, check their schedules, the last thing we want to do is make the player choose one sport over another.

Be as accommodating as possible with regards to team placement, scheduling, financing, parent requests.
